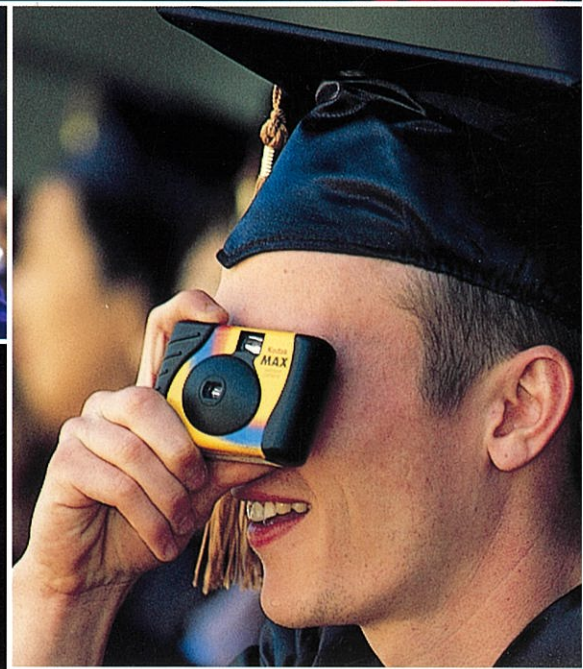

At Bentley, we combine the powerful resources of a business university with the strengths of a small college to help you develop the skills that today's top employers are looking for. You'll draw on a varied curriculum to shape an academic program that reflects your interests and goals.



business meets technology

college-wide focus

As a business university, Bentley has the resources to invest in the tools of the information age, put them in students' hands, and offer a remarkable depth of business-related majors and concentrations. This emphasis on information technology and hands-on experience prepares you for success in our global, information-driven economy. Through a variety of courses in the arts and sciences, you'll also gain skills in critical thinking, decision-making, communication and other areas essential to becoming a well-rounded, contributing member of our society.

In courses throughout the curriculum, you will gain a solid understanding of the latest computer technologies and ways that smart companies use these high-tech tools. You will develop the ability to analyze and manage the deluge of information that fuels today's business world.

For example, students in a marketing course study technology-based research and measurement tools by weighing the pros and cons of World Wide Web surveys and supermarket scan cards. An accounting information systems course shows how companies use technology to collect and analyze the reams of data generated by daily business activity. Diving into the fast-paced world of e-commerce, you'll see how technology can create and drive new lines of business.



flexible curriculum

a firm foundation

While focused on business, a Bentley education is broad in scope. A full 50 percent of required courses — called the General Education Core — are in the arts and sciences. You'll find courses like those offered at liberal arts colleges, and some you won't see anywhere else. For example, our Philosophy Department presents courses like Eastern World Religions and Introduction to Logic, as well as business-slanted courses: Philosophy of Work and Business Ethics. You'll also take an introductory course on information technology and the computing resources at Bentley.

business core

In your first year, you'll take the World of Business course, which examines the nature and functioning of business organizations; topics include making decisions, setting goals, developing and implementing strategies, and measuring

results. Two additional courses, Managing Teams and the Legal Environment of Business, introduce first-year students to other important principles of business. A group of 10 business courses, required of all Bachelor of Science students, offers a firm grounding in key areas such as accounting, computer information systems, finance, management and marketing.

small college atmosphere

prize personal attention

While our curriculum offers a breadth and depth usually found only in university programs, the experience at Bentley is student centered. We are a teaching-focused college that offers you a personal experience, with small classes and an excellent faculty-student ratio of 1 to 14. There are no lecture halls at Bentley. All of our courses are taught by professors — not graduate assistants — who put a premium on first-rate teaching and advising.

The Princeton Review's *Best Colleges* guide noted that students reserve their "highest accolades for the Bentley faculty, to whom they give excellent marks for both teaching and accessibility."

Whether in their office or logged onto e-mail, Bentley faculty are eager to interact one-on-one with students and make the learning process as lively as possible.



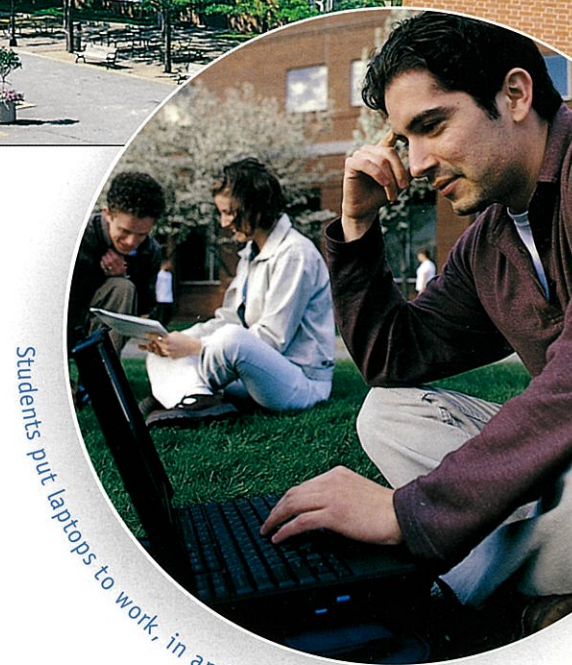
first-year seminar

Designed exclusively for freshmen, the First-Year Seminar will help get your college career off to a good start. Led by two-person teams of staff and students, the seminar introduces topics such as academic planning, faculty expectations, group process, student responsibilities, individual learning styles, diversity, gender issues, and interpersonal communication. The course is taught seminar style, with an emphasis on readings and class discussion. Small classes help to encourage sharing of ideas.

find a focus

major opportunities

"What's your major?" is a question you're likely to hear often during the next four years. Don't worry if you don't have a concrete answer yet. General education and business core requirements at Bentley encourage you to explore many different subjects during your first years here. You can also rely on guidance from the academic adviser you'll be matched with as a freshman and sophomore. Once you declare a major, you will be paired with a faculty member from the appropriate academic department. Your advisers are a resource not only for choosing courses but for switching majors if your career interests change over time.

go deep

The diverse nature of business offers many ways to tie together different topics. At Bentley you can begin combining your interests through a minor program that complements your major area of study. A marketing major who's interested in public relations might minor in English, for example, while an accountancy major thinking about a legal or public service career could minor in law. A minor in information technology develops knowledge and skills with special relevance in the high-tech business world of today. Management and psychology is another popular combination.

reach higher
honors program

Looking for a real challenge? If you're among the top students in Bentley's entering class, expect an invitation to join the undergraduate Honors Program. Those who accept the offer take two honors courses per semester as freshmen and sophomores, and three honors courses in the junior year. Open only to students in the Honors Program, the courses are small and seminar-like, with an interactive format that emphasizes students' written and oral contributions. As a senior, you'll work closely with a faculty adviser to complete a capstone honors project in your major or a related field of your choice. Special co-curricular activities include films, speakers, visits to innovative companies, faculty colloquia, and trips to the theaters, concert halls, and museums for which Boston is famous the world over.

pick up the pace

Maybe you've always liked the fast track. At Bentley, students who are academically talented and highly motivated can earn both undergraduate and graduate degrees in only five years, rather than in the six years usually required. Combine any of Bentley's undergraduate majors in business or the arts and sciences with your choice of nine Master of Business Administration and Master of Science programs. The Five-Year Program offers built-in faculty advising, an array of special learning activities, and admission to the McCallum Graduate School of Business at Bentley — without having to take the Graduate Management Admission Test. It's a great chance to open up your career prospects with a wider-than-usual skill-set and an earlier-than-usual entry to the job market.

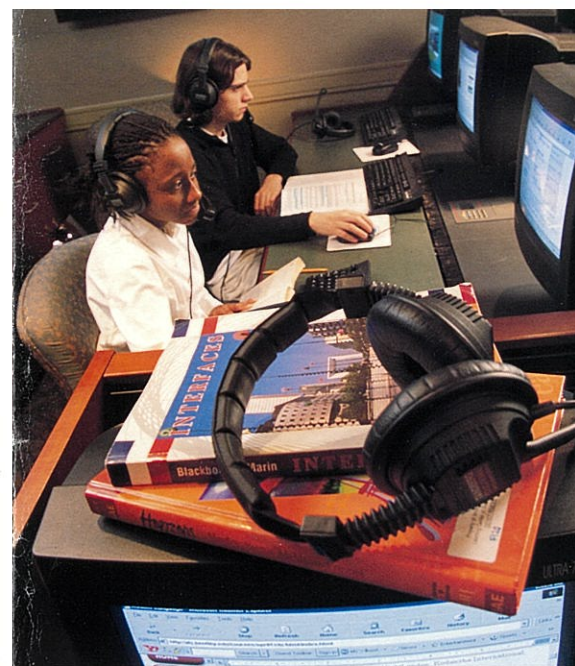
Other ways to accelerate your course of study: summer sessions, one-week intensive courses, evening courses, and Friday and Saturday accelerated sessions.

value added

Programs that you might not expect to find at a business school can boost your value to future employers. For example, Bentley is among the first U.S. business schools to offer courses in "cyberlaw," and four of our professors wrote one of the first textbooks on the subject. Course topics put an information technology spin on traditional legal issues such as copyright protection and freedom of speech.

Students with a special interest in the field of law can enroll in a pre-law program, which includes one-on-one mentoring from a Law Department faculty member. You'll get advice on choosing courses and setting career direction, along with the chance to pursue extracurricular activities such as field trips and panel discussions.

The International Studies major includes a business minor and study abroad experience, to prepare you for corporate or government careers with a global dimension.



tools you'll use

portable power

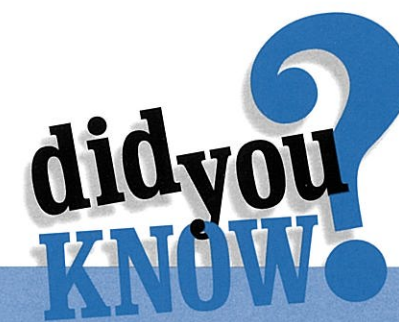
Bentley puts the power of technology in the hands of students from Day 1. How? With laptop computers and a campus that's fully wired.

Personal computers have been required tools for Bentley students since 1985. (In fact, we were among the first colleges in the U.S. to require PCs for course work.) Today, it's the laptop computer. Through the Mobile Computing program, all Bentley freshmen receive a laptop that's good-to-go: fully loaded with software and network ready. The program has a built-in upgrade after two years, to keep you connected with state-of-the-art technology.

With computer ports located all over campus — classrooms, dorm rooms, the library, and dining halls — students have incredibly fast and convenient access to the Internet, the Bentley network, and many other information sources. Laptop in hand, you'll tackle accounting projects, develop marketing plans, create web sites, tap the Internet for research, communicate worldwide via e-mail, and much more.

ramping up

An introductory computing course gives all first-year students a comprehensive overview of information technology in general and Bentley resources in particular. Workshops and tutorials are also available to help you develop and fine-tune basic computing skills in word processing, data analysis, and e-mail and Internet use. Student consultants, a Help Desk, and the Computer Resource Center can provide extra support when you need it.

hands-on resources

Test-drive the concepts and theories you'll learn in the classroom, through several hands-on, high-tech learning labs.

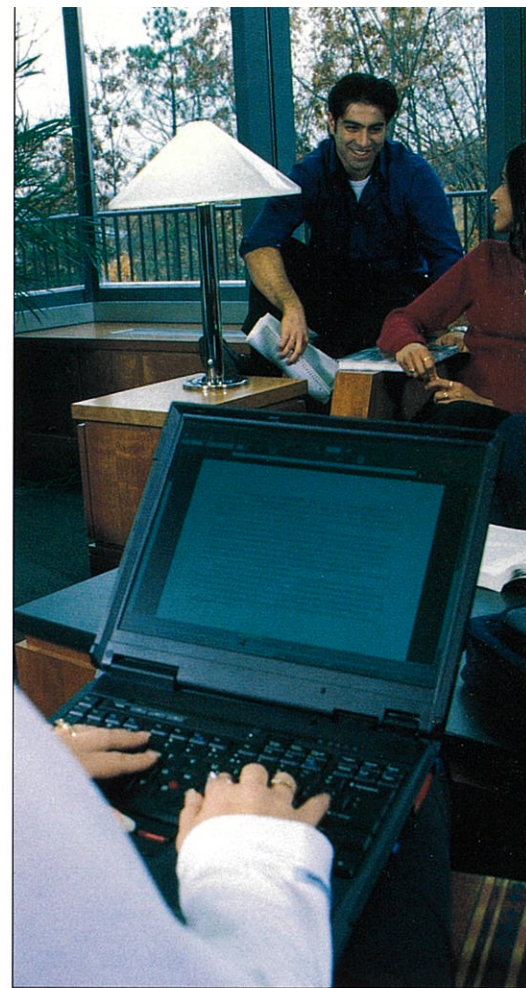
Financial Trading Room. Bentley's Trading Room — the largest in higher education — combines state-of-the-art technology and real-time data to let you explore key financial concepts. Simulated trading sessions reinforce course content, as students try their hand at building an investment portfolio, for example, and analyzing financial risk. Students first use the Trading Room during freshman orientation; they can keep using the facility throughout college, regardless of the major they choose.

Center for Marketing Technology. This lab is filled with the high-end equipment and applications that are revolutionizing the marketing of products and services. You'll learn the latest strategies for testing

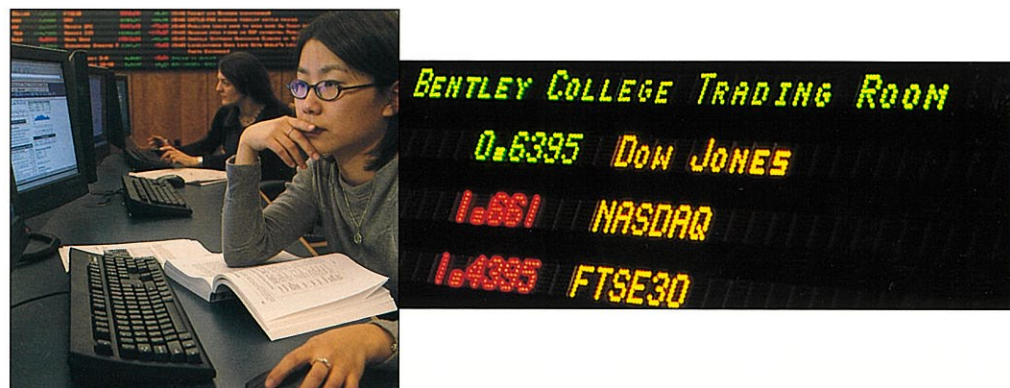
consumer preferences, creating ad campaigns, using databases to make marketing decisions, and more. Other applications focus on media planning, product design, and customer relationship management.

CLIC. The Center for Languages and International Collaboration, the centerpiece of the Center for International Studies, is a key resource for language students, international studies majors, and anyone with an interest in international issues. The center's "global theater" includes videoconference technology to promote real-time collaboration among Bentley students and professors and their overseas counterparts. At clustered computer workstations, you'll have access to multimedia language programs and web-based resources to tackle course assignments independently or in small groups. Two satellite dishes deliver news directly from the country of origin.

ACELAB. The Accounting Center for Electronic Learning and Business Measurement is a valuable resource for anyone taking an accounting course at Bentley. Using the lab's cutting-edge tools and software such as SAP and Oracle, you'll develop a broad understanding of how accounting relates to other business functions in an organization. You can also gain practical experience with auditing and tax preparation software, data modeling, and other professional applications.



Design and Usability Test Center. This facility offers up-close exposure to the field of information design and the creation of information technology products. Information design students use the center's resources to answer questions such as "Is this corporate web site easy to navigate?" Students also analyze user and task requirements, build prototypes to meet those needs, and test the usability of their designs. They use the same high-end applications employed by technical communicators, web developers, user interface designers, and usability specialists.



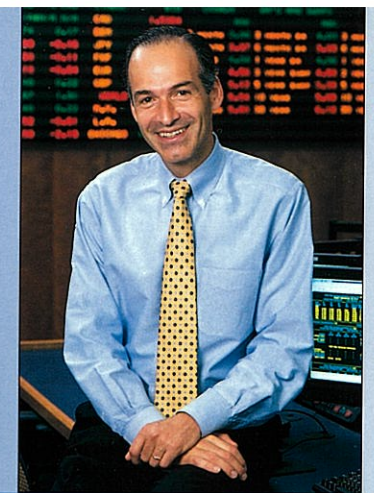
Solomon Baker Library. Along with being well stocked with books and periodicals — including extensive business, tax and career collections — Bentley's library is well connected to sophisticated and powerful electronic databases. For example, Dow Jones/Bridge News Retrieval delivers vast amounts of financial and market information on industries, companies, and countries; Lexis-Nexis is a major online source of business law information. In addition, Bentley students have access to the library collections of several other Boston-area colleges and universities.

center of the action

The college's new Student Center, which opened in January 2002, is the heart of action outside the classroom. You'll find a large dining room, games room, The 1917 Tavern, campus radio station and newspaper, and office and meeting space for student organizations. A living room with fireplace is a great place to unwind after exams, while a Sacred Space offers space for reflection. The large Back Bay function room is a perfect spot for dances, the

annual Black United Body fashion show, and the student government awards dinner. Located here, too, are many service and support offices, including the Multicultural Center, International Student and Scholar Services, and Student Life.

Up the hill, the LaCava Campus Center is where you'll find the campus bookstore, another dining room, art gallery, hair salon, postal center, and more. Be sure to stop by the Miller Center for Career Services for advice on internships and the Office of Counseling and Development for tips on studying, roommates and more.

be a good sport

Whether you're into varsity, intramural or recreational sports, the Dana Athletic Center has the resources you need. Take advantage of basketball, volleyball and racquetball courts; a four-lane indoor track; 25-meter pool with diving tank;

dance and aerobics studio; fitness center with Nautilus and StairMaster machines; a sauna; and locker rooms. Outside, the athletic fields are just as impressive. Cheer for Bentley squads on the soccer field, baseball field, track and tennis courts, which opened in spring 2002, and catch football and field hockey on the grass and Astroturf fields.

Bentley fields 23 varsity teams, which compete at the NCAA Division I and II levels. The college is a member of the Northeast-10 Conference and the Division I Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Hockey League. Many teams regularly qualify for postseason competition, and individual athletes have earned All-New England, All-East, and All-America honors. The support of Bentley fans is an important ingredient in our teams' success. For four of the last five years, Bentley's athletics program was named best in the Northeast-10 Conference.

If you're looking for friendly competition, check out Bentley's ever-growing list of intramural sports. Each year, more than 1,300 students benefit from the camaraderie, teamwork and new friendships

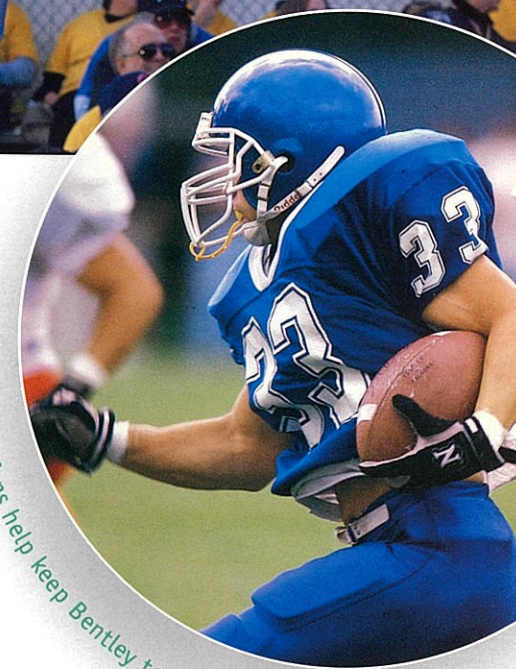


that are part of intramurals. The Dana Center also supports the health and fitness goals of the recreational athlete.

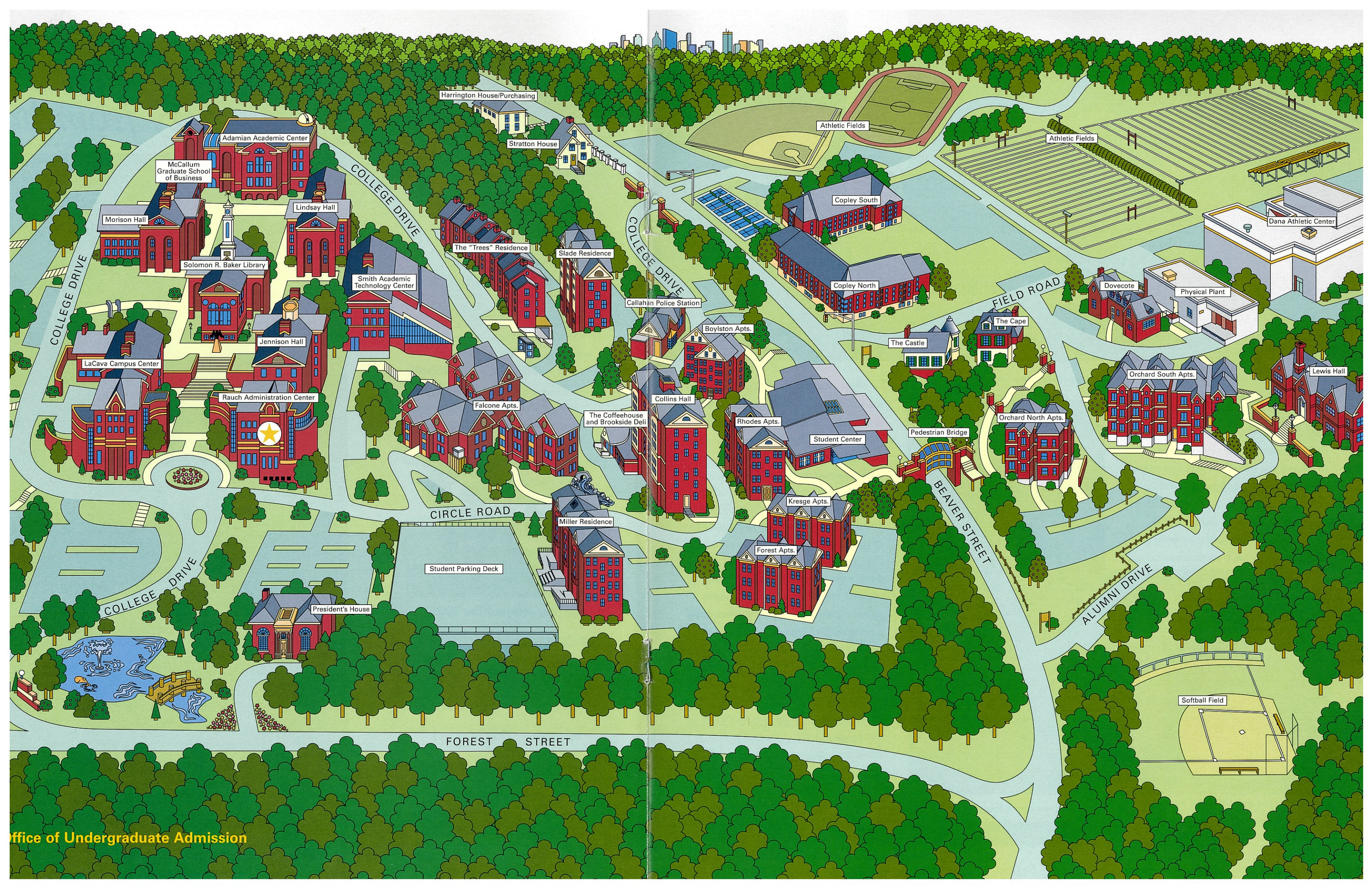
home away from home



▶ About 80 percent of full-time undergraduates live on campus. The places they call home include single, double and triple rooms in traditional residence halls; multi-person suites; and one-, two- and three-bedroom apartments. All student residences are coed, though many offer single-sex living arrangements on separate floors or wings. Residence hall common areas typically include study lounges, exercise facilities, TV lounges, and game rooms. With "one-port-per-pillow," residence halls also offer individual access to the college network and the Internet.

Student assistants and Bentley professional staff members who live in the residence halls coordinate programs and counsel students, and are on call when administrative offices are closed. Take part in residence hall programming and decision-making by joining your Hall Council, whose members work with staff to recommend policies and organize activities. Residence halls are updated regularly to keep pace with student needs; the two newest halls opened in September 2001.

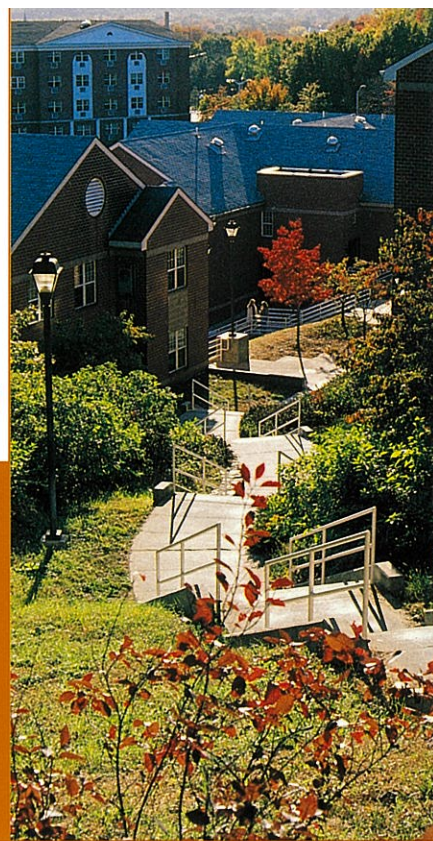

Hands-on experience

"Learn by doing" is a core philosophy at Bentley. Hands-on experience is key to many courses, and we're always investigating ways to bridge theory and practice — particularly in applying information technology. You'll gain real-world skills that truly count with future employers.

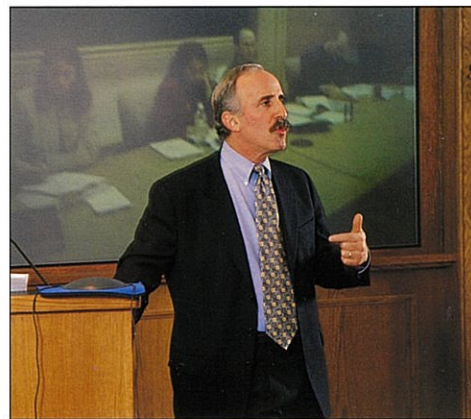


experience counts

faculty experts

Bentley professors stay closely connected to the business world. For you, that means course content that reflects the latest industry practice and class projects with real-world applicability and value. The practical experience that faculty bring to the classroom comes from their professional involvement with companies such as PricewaterhouseCoopers, General Electric, SAP America, and many other leading organizations in the U.S. and abroad. So you can be sure that along with studying the general principles of a discipline such as management or finance, you'll also be learning about current practices and future directions in the field.

You will also benefit from professors' collaborative approach to teaching. Faculty members strongly encourage student participation; your new ideas and insights enrich class discussion. This give-and-take



thrives in small classes (about 25 to 30 students each). Many classrooms have computerized projection systems and "roundtable" design that give an added boost to interactive learning.

consulting projects

Put your new business skills to work right away in Bentley courses that require group consulting work. For instance, during junior year all business students are required to enroll in the course Integrated Business Functions, in which they work with a real

company in the process of launching a new product or service. Student teams work with a faculty member and company management to conduct customized market research and write a business plan.

There are benefits on both sides. Ntirety Technologies CEO Michael Corey (a 1984 Bentley alumnus) reports that his company changed its pricing structure and introduced a new product as a result of the students' research. Meanwhile, students gained experience in specific job functions, general insight into the business world, and an important introduction to the process of working in a team.

internships

Through both credit and not-for-credit internships at some of the leading companies in the U.S., you can fine-tune skills, explore interests, make valuable connections, and apply classroom theory in the workplace. Paid and unpaid internships are available in nearly every field, from

accountancy to computer information systems, corporate communication to finance. Customize your experience to fit not only your career goals but also your timetable: Full- and part-time positions are available during the fall, spring or summer.

service-learning

Students in a business law course help a public Internet center by developing training materials on privacy, trademark law, and "cyberethics." Corporate communication students organize resumé-writing workshops for the unemployed. Twenty students spend spring break renovating housing for economically disadvantaged residents. Another group from the International Studies department travels to Hungary to learn conflict management and mediate political issues with the Gypsy Roma community. These kinds of opportunities, coordinated through Bentley's **Service-Learning Center**, help students build valuable skills in business, communication and teamwork while also contributing to society. Though the assignments themselves are usually unpaid, qualified students can apply for work-study funding or service-learning scholarships.

study abroad

In today's global economy, people with experience living and working overseas have a real career advantage. At Bentley you can gain such experience in countries that include Australia, Austria, Belgium, England, France, Hong Kong, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Mexico and Spain. Study abroad programs may run for a single semester or a full academic year; summer opportunities are available as well.

invest in your future

Will your investment in a Bentley education pay off? In addition, CCS works with Bentley's academic departments to coordinate the Internship Program. You can learn how to effectively market your internship and other work experience to prospective employers at CCS-sponsored workshops.

on-campus recruiting

In addition to hosting an annual fall Career Fair that attracts more than 100 companies, CCS links graduating students with prospective employers through an on-campus recruiting program that runs from October through April. Before interviewing with a company representative, students attend workshops on resumé writing, interviewing, and job search strategies. 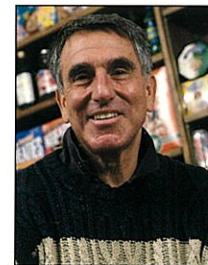

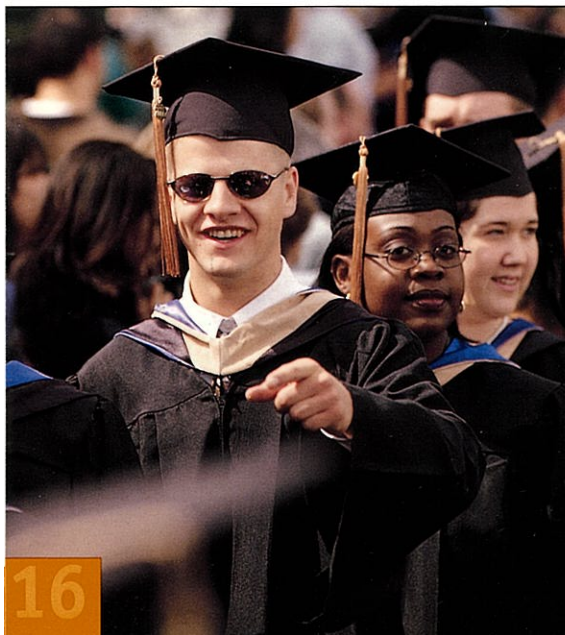

We're all here for the same purpose — to develop the students to their fullest and to help them reach their full potential — whether it's on the athletic fields or in the classroom.

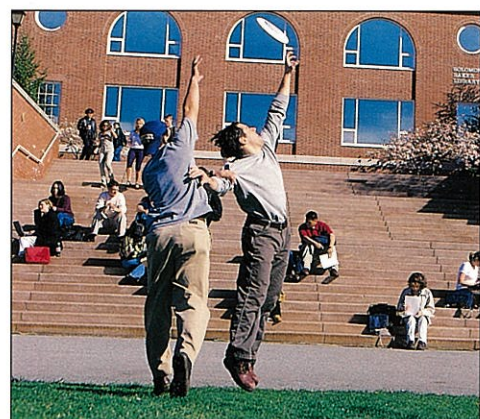
Smart investment

how to apply

The first step in applying for financial aid is to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and the Financial Aid PROFILE. You can apply online, at www.fafsa.ed.gov and www.collegeboard.org. Your high school guidance office also should have copies of the FAFSA and the PROFILE registration guide. To keep the application process on track, be sure to meet published deadlines and supply all requested information and documentation.



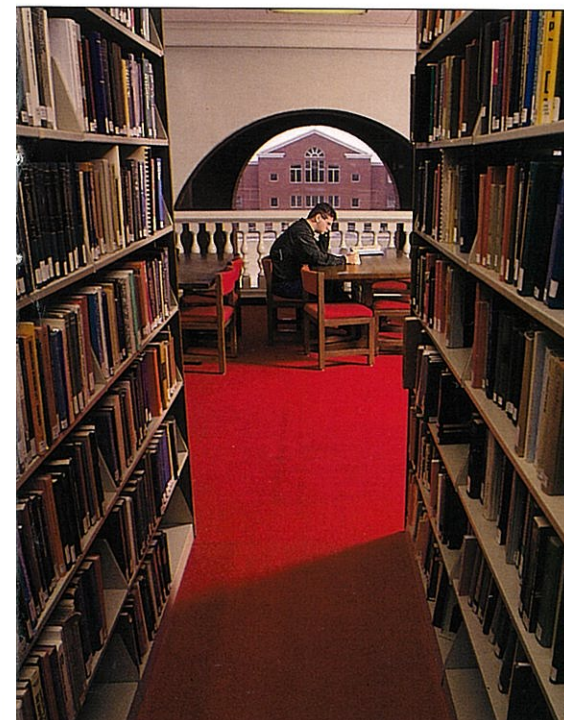
Using the information you provide, Bentley applies two different formulas in determining your need for aid. We use "federal methodology" to assess your eligibility for federal and most state aid programs, and "institutional methodology" to evaluate your eligibility for Bentley funds. Then we create an aid package to help meet your financial need; it may include any of the types of aid described below.

types of aid

Financial aid is available from federal, state, and Bentley sources. Scholarships and grants are awarded based on financial need, academic promise, special skills, or some combination thereof; the awards do not have to be repaid. Work opportunities include on-campus and off-campus jobs available through programs sponsored by the federal government and by Bentley. Low-interest loans from federal and state sources may also be part of the package; repayment can span up to 10 years.

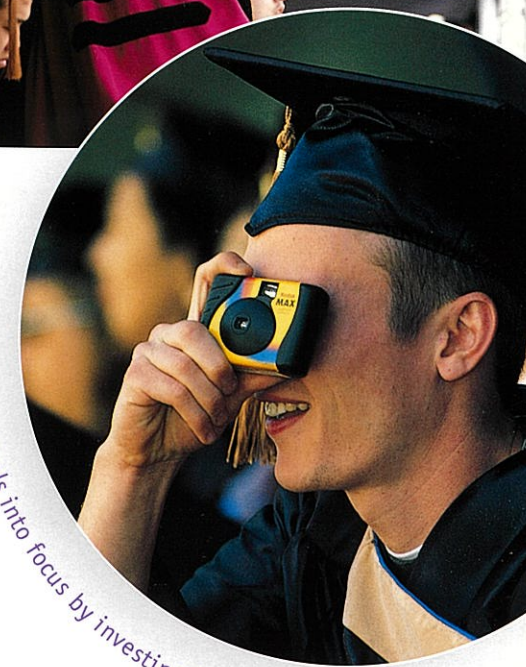
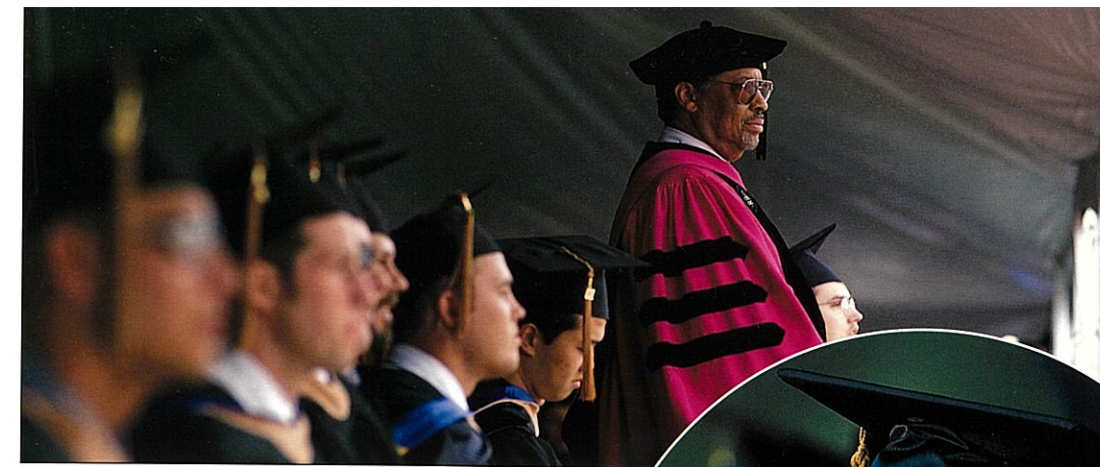


flexible financing

Several payment options are available to help students who need flexibility in paying tuition bills. The monthly payment plan enables qualified students to pay tuition, room, board, and other expenses in 10 equal installments, beginning in June. The college also offers a prepayment plan. By paying for up to eight semesters at the tuition rate in effect when you enroll in the plan, you can avoid any future tuition increases.

resources that can help

Families sometimes overlook opportunities that can help make college affordable. At Bentley we're ready to help you explore all possible financing options. The Office of Financial Assistance provides information and guidance to all students — including those who have not yet made their college choice. You'll learn about the process for determining financial need, the different kinds of aid available, and how to identify the programs best suited to your situation.

In making your college choice, it pays to consider the facts about financial assistance.

- Your ability to pay is not a factor in the Bentley admission process.
- More than 60 percent of Bentley students receive some form of financial assistance, through scholarships and grants, loans, and work opportunities.
- Bentley administers more than \$52 million in undergraduate financial aid every year. Nearly half of that amount comes from the college's own funds.
- Families at all income levels may be eligible to receive grant aid from Bentley. For example, scholarships can recognize your academic achievement or community service.

Admission

Admission to Bentley is selective, based on your past accomplishments and future potential. We look at your academic record, essay, counselor and teacher recommendations, and standardized test results. A solid college prep program provides a foundation for further achievement.



programs for freshmen

early decision

Designed for academic achievers for whom Bentley is the first choice, the Early Decision program allows for an admission decision by January 1. If admitted, Early Decision candidates must then withdraw any applications to other colleges. The deadline for submitting the Early Decision application and other required documents is December 1. The enrollment deposit is due in January.



early action

If Bentley is among your top colleges but you prefer not to make a commitment, you can receive an early admission decision through the Early Action program. The application deadline is December 1, and decision notification is in late January. Early Action candidates have until May 1 to indicate their intention to enroll at Bentley College.

regular admission

Submit all required documents by February 1 for September admission and by November 15 for January admission. We will notify you of the admission decision by April 1 for the fall semester and in early December for the spring. You will have until May 1 to make the enrollment decision for fall entry.

international students

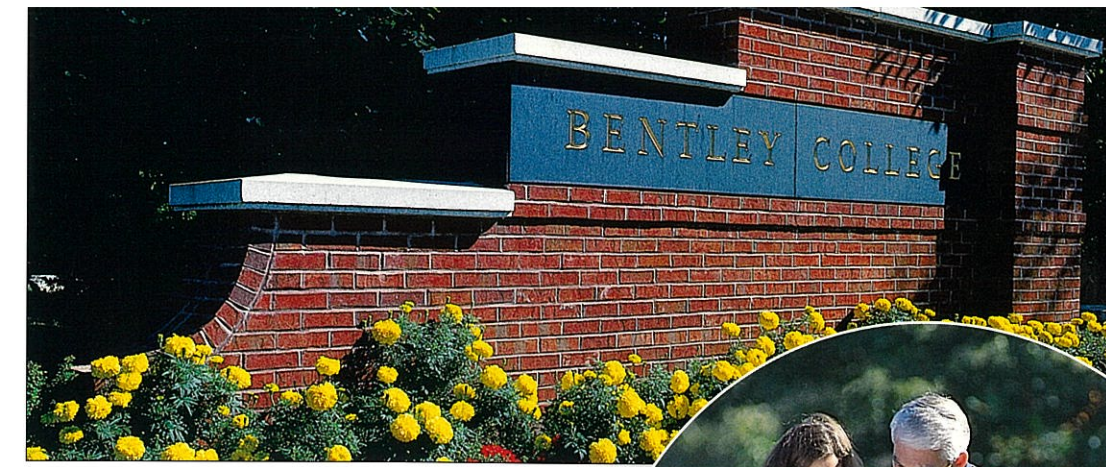
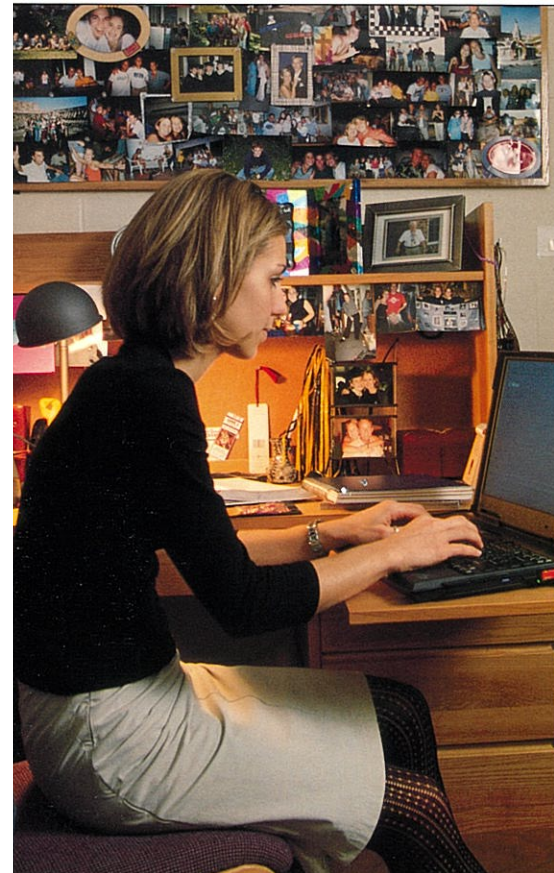
A degree from an educational institution in the U.S. is a valuable commodity in today's global marketplace. Bentley's international population comprises approximately 500 students, representing 78 countries, from Argentina to Zimbabwe. These students not only benefit from the Bentley experience but enrich the campus community with different perspectives and viewpoints. International students follow the same application deadlines as Bentley's domestic students.

transfer applicants

Each year, about 200 students transfer to Bentley from other colleges and universities. The college offers rolling admission for transfer candidates, although the preferred deadline is May 1 for September entrance and November 15 for admission in January.

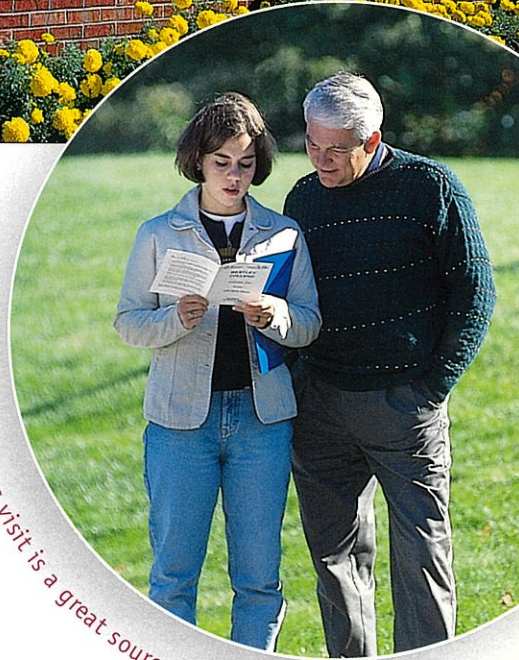

bentley in brief

location

Set on 163 acres in Waltham, Mass., Bentley offers the best of both worlds: a small suburban campus with ready access to some of the best college towns in the country. Boston and Cambridge are just 10 miles away.

curriculum

Bentley is a national leader in combining business education and information technology. A balanced blend of business and arts and sciences courses fosters students' skills in critical thinking, creative problem-solving, and effective communication. Business courses at Bentley are accredited by the AACSB – The International Association for Management Education.

faculty

About 400 full-time and part-time faculty members teach at Bentley; 85 percent of full-time professors hold doctoral degrees. Professors are committed to excellent teaching and advising, while also pursuing research and scholarship in their academic field. The average class size is 25 to 30 students, encouraging class discussion.

students

The college enrolls approximately 4,250 full-time and part-time undergraduates. Students come from about 40 U.S. states and 78 countries. Enrollment at Bentley's McCallum Graduate School of Business is 1,300 students.

costs

Full-time undergraduate tuition for the 2001-2002 academic year is \$21,865. Room and board is \$9,010.

financial assistance

Approximately 60 percent of Bentley students receive assistance through grants, scholarships, loans, and employment.

careers

The Nathan R. Miller Center for Career Services offers a comprehensive series of workshops, programs, and resource materials to help students identify personal values, abilities and goals related to career choice. directions to campus

▶ by car

from the west

Take the Massachusetts Turnpike to exit 14 and follow signs to Route 95/128 North. Continue as directed in “From the South,” below.

from the south

Take Route 95/128 North to Trapelo Road, exit 28A; turn right at the end of the exit ramp and follow 2.6 miles toward Belmont. Turn right onto Forest Street. Approximately one mile on the left is the Bentley College main campus entrance.

from the north

Take Route 95/128 South to Trapelo Road, exit 28; turn left at the top of the exit ramp and follow Trapelo Road 2.6 miles toward Belmont. Turn right onto Forest Street. Approximately one mile on the left is the Bentley College main campus entrance.

from boston and points east

Take Storrow Drive (west) or Memorial Drive (west) to the end and follow signs toward Arlington. Bear left at sign that reads “To 16 S Watertown, Waltham.” Follow for .6 of a mile and turn right onto Belmont Street after passing the supermarket shopping center on the right. Continue on Belmont Street, until it intersects with Trapelo Road. Bear right onto Trapelo Road and continue for 1.7 miles. Take a left at the light and follow the sign that reads “60 Waltham to Rte. 20.” This is Waverley Oaks Road (Route 60). At the next traffic light, turn right onto Beaver Street. Continue on Beaver Street, which intersects the Bentley College campus. Take College Drive, which will be on the right at the traffic light.

▶ by local transportation

Take the MBTA Red Line to the Harvard/Brattle stop in Harvard Square. From there, take the number 73 trackless trolley marked “Waverley Square.” Bus number 554, “Waverley Square–Downtown Boston,” leaves Waverley Square and travels along Beaver Street; this street intersects the Bentley College campus. Contact the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA) at 800/392-6100 for the current bus schedule.

▶ by train or air

Amtrak offers frequent passenger service to South Station in Boston from all points along the Northeast Corridor, including Philadelphia, Trenton, Baltimore, New York, New Haven, Providence, and Washington, D.C. From South Station, public transportation is available to the campus.

Most major airlines fly frequently to Boston’s Logan International Airport. Transportation by taxi, MBTA trains and buses is available.
